What We Accomplished



Letter from our President

In 2012, the Detroit Rescue Mission Ministries served record numbers of people. Last year, we provided emergency shelter, housing, substance-abuse treatment, food boxes, Christmas gifts, and other basic services to more than 16,000 men, women, and children.

One new initiative in 2012 was DRMM's 100 Houses project where DRMM worked with Detroit Mayor Dave Bing, as well as over 1,000 volunteers and numerous local businesses, to board up nearly 300 abandoned homes in neighborhoods surrounding schools. This made children's walks to school safer every day from the dangers present in vacant buildings.

DRMM also began providing homeless veterans each year throughout our community with employment training and workforce development as part of a grant provided by the Department of Labor. Through this program, DRMM will serve 200 veterans each year.

The Mission similarly unveiled an initiative that will place 22 homeless families into homes throughout the Cities of Detroit and Highland Park over the next three years, homes rehabilitated by DRMM. Last year alone, DRMM rehabbed five homes and gave them away to families with children just in time for the Holidays.

DRMM made a major effort to enhance its program capacity by acquiring two new buildings, at 12900 West Chicago and 19211 Anglin Street in Detroit, which now house DRMM's women's transitional housing program and men's treatment center, respectively. At the same time, DRMM moved three other programs into existing facilities. These changes allow DRMM to accommodate the growing needs of those we serve, and provide a much better living and service environment.

Lastly, in 2012, DRMM received glowing remarks and a three-year accreditation renewal from CARF, the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities. CARF is the gold standard for nonprofit human services providers across the globe.

This brief list of accomplishments from 2012 reaffirms to us how important our donors and funders are each year. Without your support of time, money, and prayer, none of these successes would have been possible. Thanks to you, 1,600 people every day receive life-sustaining and life-changing services.


Mission Statement

Mission Overview

The Detroit Rescue Mission Ministries has served Detroit's homeless since 1909. Expanding ever since in response to the needs of the surrounding community, today DRMM is the nation's largest rescue mission, serving over 1,600 individuals every day, by providing meals, shelter, housing, and substance-abuse treatment to inner-city men, women, children, and families. DRMM is a faith-based, non-profit organization, recognized by CARF and has devoted a wealth of resources to meet the basic needs of humanity in an effort to revitalize the communities we serve.

Simultaneously, we provide the support services needed to allow those who pass through our doors to live healthy, independent lives, free of addiction and homelessness. As such, we are one of the largest providers in the fight against homelessness and substance abuse in the country.

As an organization, we are committed to fulfilling the changing needs of our community in innovative ways. DRMM adheres to the Continuum of Care, implemented to combat the cycle of poverty and addiction. Depending on an individual's needs at intake, our residents move from shelter and substance-abuse treatment, to transitional housing, before being reintegrated into permanent homes, their former communities, and into the workforce.
